## Buddhist Teachers across traditions leading social movements

- Overview: What is socially engaged Buddhism? How has it evolved across traditions? How do we embrace socially engaged Buddhism in the Theravada tradition? Taking the dhamma off the cushion... what does that mean?
- The stories of Ledi Sayadaw, Mahasi Sayadaw, and other early teachers. The impact of colonialism.
- Did the Buddha engage in socially engaged Buddhism? Many scholars suggest so because of who he invited into his sangha, his message, etc.
- Bhikku Bodhi's analysis inviting Theravada practitioners to engage in the concerns of the larger community.

- See various authors' works noted as places to begin to discuss interconnectivity leading to socially engaged Buddhism across race, ethnicity, gender, the environment, war, interreligious dialogue, etc.
- Note the conversations between Thich Nhat Hahn and Daniel Berrigan from 1974 (interreligious dialogue during a time of war; connection to Martin Luther King, Jr; an iteration of today.)
- Do we engage in "practice" as a religious tradition, meditative technique, both, neither? New lawsuits are asking that question of mindfulness programming receiving public funding.
- Questions to consider: Is the purpose of the practice to give us the stability to move beyond the individual to the collective? If so, in what ways? In what ways is that perhaps not the expectation, and what then?
